PWP Self-Editing Checklist

Theme Development

Determine your compelling message

Fine tune to a focused point

Prepare to write with well-researched details—mark sources for footnotes and bibliography

Apply Scripture in a proper and accurate manner—be theologically sound

Overall Structure

Create an opening hook to capture the reader and draw them in

Craft a strong beginning, meaty middle, memorable ending

Make clear transitions to guide readers through the flow of ideas

Tie all thoughts together in a sensible sequence—logical progression of thought

Include adequate details to thoroughly inform the reader—backstory, full-bodied descriptions

Clarity of Language

Show—don't tell—with vivid imagery, painting scenes and action in the reader's mind

Create crisp dialogue to put reader in the scene rather than simply stating what happened

Limit the use of "to be" verbs: is, are, was, were, etc.

Use sensory details—sight, sound, smell, taste, touch

Employ the figures of speech—simile, metaphor, personification, etc.

Don't over-use words in sentences—use a thesaurus

Use powerful, precise, descriptive words instead of weak words i.e. went, put, etc.

Vary sentence length and structure

Don't repeat starting words in sentences and paragraphs

Avoid redundancy of thought (saying the same thing in a different way once stated)

Delete unnecessary words, i.e. very, just, then, so, etc.

Delete adverbs for more precise action verbs—scant use of "ly" adverbs

Shorten run-on sentences

Writing Conventions

Check capital letters at the start of sentences and proper nouns

Check that pronouns reference the subject

Check subject and verb agreement in singulars and plurals

Check punctuation

Check spacing—only one space between sentences

Check spelling

Voice

Show awareness of purpose and target audience

Infuse with personality and passion
