

“GET OUT OF THE BOAT” WORKSHOP

Step out of the boat of political correctness and "walk on the water" of Spirit-led writing that expresses the truth of God's Word. Tackle sensitive subjects such as abortion and euthanasia, from a Biblical perspective. Motivate without manipulating people to make choices in line with Scripture.

“Get Out of the Boat” – Based on a story from Matthew 14:22-33.

- Peter requests permission to do the impossible—walk on the water to meet Jesus.
- When Peter *takes his eyes off Jesus*, he begins to sink, and Jesus has to save him.
- We should not criticize Peter for beginning to sink—he had the courage to “Get Out of the Boat.”

Which boat best describes the one you currently occupy?

- Political Correctness
 - Frustrated, lacking the courage to tackle sensitive subjects in accordance with God’s Word
 - Afraid of ridicule, losing friends or income
 - Swayed by public opinion, news media, polling data
- Procrastinating Compromiser
 - Waiting for someone else to do it
 - Apathetic because the task seems insurmountable
 - Wallowing in apostasy and rebellion
- Purposeful Communicator
 - Fearlessly communicating God’s opinion on sensitive issues
 - Writing under inspiration of the Holy Spirit
 - Pastors: Preaching/writing in agreement with Ordination Vows

Christian writers and pastors, face the challenge of addressing sensitive issues from a Biblical perspective.

- When watching the evening news, what pushes your buttons and vexes your spirit?
- What causes your blood pressure to rise or your nostrils to flare?
- What do you wish you could change?
- Therein is your summons to rise up in the power of the Holy Spirit and be heard.

Bible characters who faced “government versus God” situations courageously

- Hebrew midwives—Shiphrah and Puah did not kill male Hebrew babies as commanded by Pharaoh.
- Moses – Represented God in opposing Pharaoh repeatedly.
- Rahab – Hid the Hebrew spies and covered her tracks with the king’s representatives.
- Esther –Risked her life by going before the king uninvited—“If I perish, I perish!” (Esther 4:15-16)
- Nehemiah – Called by God to rebuild Jerusalem wall, strongly opposed by enemies. (Nehemiah 6:15-16)
- Peter & John – Jailed, threatened, and commanded not to preach in Jesus’ name. “We ought to obey God rather than men.” (Acts 5:29).

- Apostle Paul – Falsely accused, stoned and left for dead, tried illegally, shipwrecked...
- These Bible characters defied their government—they “got out of the boat of Political Correctness.”
- They walked on tempestuous waves; they obeyed God and faced the consequences.

The Bible Warns Us that Hard Times Will Come:

- Jesus: “In the world, ye shall have tribulation.” (John 16:33b)
- Apostle Paul: “All that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution.” (II Timothy 3:12)
- Have the courage to “Get Out of the Boat” and “Write His Answer.”

Horrific Headlines: Would have caused public outrage a few years ago, on these subjects

- Abortion
- Euthanasia
- Homosexuality/Lesbianism
- Transgenderism
- Heterosexual Immorality
- Public Prayer and Religious Liberty
- Nationalism
- Political Ploys

God’s Design for Marriage and Sexual Expression:

Challenges to Christian Writers:

- Willingness to stand for truth, even when it’s politically incorrect
- Refusal to compromise God’s Word for popularity or financial security
- Care not to label Biblical topics as “political” to avoid dealing with them

Challenge to Pastors: Honoring Ordination Vows

- Preaching not only on God’s love, His blessings, grace, mercy, etc., but also on the punitive aspects of God’s nature—His wrath, indignation and judgment of sin.
- My responsibility as a minister is my response to His ability through me.

Is There Hope?

- Responsibility to pray for elected officials
- Responsibility to “Vote Your Conscience”
- Responsibility to pray for pastors—may God send revival to the pulpits of America!”
